WINTER PAW CARE AND SAFETY

As winter approaches you need to be reminding your humans to take a bit of time to think about you and specifically your paws.

This is not only directed at dogs, it is directed to all animals that may go out or be exposed to outdoor clothing/shoes.

There are a few vital things your humans need to know:

Frost/ice snow.

Although we can walk outside in most weather conditions and our humans usually forget to think about us the 'nice walk' across the long hot path or sea of gravel in the summer, they need to be constantly reminded that we can suffer from toxic poisoning, frostbite, ice burns and

cracked paws which could lead not only to pain, infections but also in some cases – death !!

Antifreeze/Screen Wash for vehicles.

This is poisonous for us. Now I am not expecting you to remind your humans to top up their cars, but for you to remind them that if they spill any on the ground or their shoes they need to clear it up. Better still if possible store their shoes where you cannot reach them and to take them off before walking through the house.

Road grit/salt

This is poisonous for us. Not only if your humans clear their path or even just take you for a walk, they need to know this can both burn you or poison you if you lick your

paws after a walk.

If after all your attempts to educate your humans they still do not take necessary precautions during winter refuse to leave the house, or better still shout 'HUGE VET BILLS'

Get them to:

Check your paws for cracks/cuts and ice.

Clean/wash your paws after a walk.

Ensure you are wrapped up well when going for walks, but making sure you don't over-heat too.

Take care with liquids when topping up their vehicles.

Stay safe during winter furpals and get your human told of the dangers.

CHECK VEHICLES FOR CATS

Cats often crawl into vehicle's engines and wheel arches to keep warm.

It is not always enough to look for paw prints in the snow as it may have snowed after the cat squeezed into the engine, or there may be no snow on the ground at all.

A lot of humans think opening

and closing the vehicle door is enough to warn a sleeping cat.

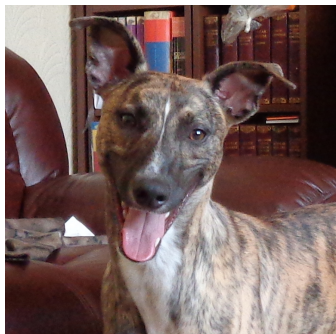
However cats do not spring into action the moment they hear something. Especially if they have been asleep for a while during the cold weather.

knock on their bonnet or walk around wiping and tapping their lights before opening their vehicle door.

This would give the cat time to wake up and squeeze its way out of wherever they were sleeping.

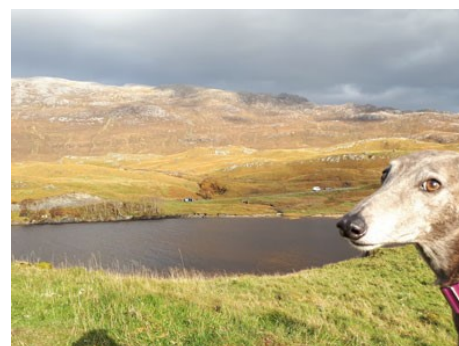
John O'Groats was amazing to lead walk in although Dunnet is the true north.

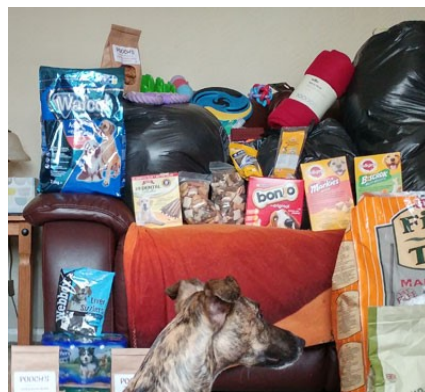

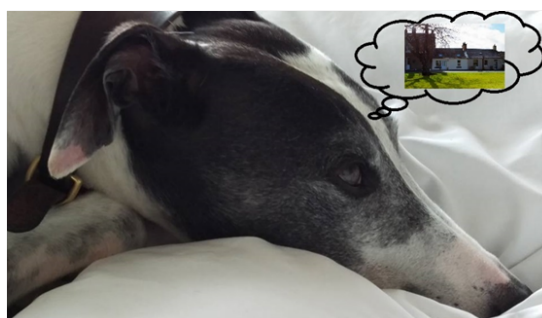

FRAUDULENT APPEALS FOR HELP AND MONEY

There has been an increase in fraudulent social media appeals claiming to be for the benefit of an animal.

As social media and emails are rapidly becoming the main source of communication unfortunately it is becoming an easier target for fraudsters to use this type of 'money collection'.

Now before you all start jumping on your keyboards and contacting me, you need to read all of this article.

My aim is ensure everyone's hard earned cash they choose to donate, is directed towards genuine charities/individuals where animals actually get the help they need.

Requests for money may involve a tragic story about an animal, some even have upsetting pictures to make the request more believable.

They use a variety of tactics to gain access to your money. One tactic is to do a social media campaign and wait for the unsuspecting public to send money.

Another more involved tactic

is to send out emails requesting money or even thanking you for your donation/order. Individuals may have a personal appeal and I am not saying they are all fraudsters, I am saying just be careful and aware.

The key thing with the email is to NOT click on the attached document. This document may have have a virus that will attempt to get details from you, mostly to get your bank details.

In most cases the emails thanking you for your donation are merely a tactic to get you to click on the document before you have time to think.

If you ever get an email thanking you for your donation/order then check with your bank directly if you need peace of mind. Don't forget your bank can check on transactions that are still pending so you will be told if any activity has occurred on your account.

Always be careful of any emails with documents attached or links for you to click on, even if they appear to be from your friends.

What can you do to protect yourselves?

Genuine charities will have their charity number displayed on their website/blog page/facebook page/other advertising.

They will not mind being asked questions as they will be aware these fraudsters are not only taking potential donations from their animals in need, but also damaging real charities reputations.

Individuals asking for money for their pet, if you do not personally know the individual then ask for the contact details of the vet dealing with the animal and donate directly to the vet.

Always be sure who you are about to give money to. There is a government page where you can check that charities are genuine.

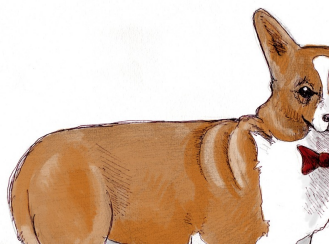

HISTORY OF A CORGI



When I first looked into doing the history of a Corgi I thought it would involve re-search, which I expected, and writing an article. What I have since discovered is that a corgi, although small, are very interesting to research. This is what I discovered.

There are two breeds of Corgi, the Pembroke and the Cardigan and both are dogs from Wales, their names taken from the Counties they originated from. The Cardigan is the larger of the two breeds and the Pembroke has the natural bob or short tail.

The name Corgi has a number

of names and thoughts about its origin.

It has been said that the Corgi started out as Curci, meaning cur (mixed breed) and ci (dog).

hi Doris, I think you should be able to wear your jammies as often or as long as you want.

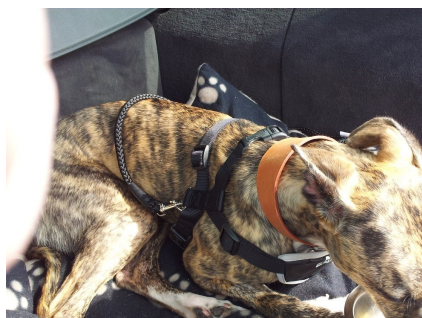
Unless you are going out for a walk as you should change into more appropriate outdoor clothing.

DOGS - WHAT SHOULD I EAT?



I am not a nutritionist nor do I work in the animal food industry.

This is a non scientific attempt at explaining how you can be more informed as to how to select the best food for you with out telling you what to choose.

I do NOT cover specialist dietary requirements as you should be talking to your vet and not a dog on the internet (me).

One of the most common questions on animal groups is 'What should I get my human to feed me?'

Here is an overview of what humans should be looking at and be considering while picking food for you.

Now before you consider rushing out to change your diet, you need to remember what ever you are on now is what your stomach is used to. So any changes need to be gradual - even if it is keeping to the same type but a different brand.

Food comes in all shapes and sizes. It also comes in all different grades of nutritional value too.

You need to try to spend time researching the best for you and also be able to stick within your budget too. Now don't be fooled into thinking the cheapest is the worst and the most expensive food is the absolute best.

Make sure you read the ingredients label and check that you know what you are eating.

The primary thing to remember when buying any food is that colours are generally for the human's benefit.

Let's face it they would not feed their small humans on artificially coloured food for every meal would they?

As a dog myself, my first thing would be to use my sense of smell, taste etc.

The actual colour would be low down on my list of priorities for selecting food. You may think 'but my dog loves x colour in their food'. Well no not really what we are selecting is based on smell and texture.

Also how you fare fed is important. If you are taller you will need a raised feeder. That can be a shop bought stand or a creative homemade device

that will not tip or have anything that you could get hurt on.

Some dogs get fed once a day and some get fed several times a day.

The key thing is to get your humans to listen , yes listen, to you. If you are fed once a day and they look like a keg and are struggling to move then you need your daily food split up into different meals.

If you are fed several times a day and are still hungry then start throwing your bowl around straight after a meal to let your humans know you may need bigger portions and less often throughout the day.

For food the choices are seemingly endless but there only a few real choices, the rest are down to brand names and packaging.

The first place you need to look is on the food label. Once you familiarise yourself on how to read the label then the next step can be a lot easier for you.

On the label the ingredients are listed in order of 'most to least'. Now this sounds great if it starts with Beef. However if there 99 other ingredients, just how much Beef is there in the food?

DOGS - WHAT SHOULD I EAT?

Plus a lot of manufacturers fill up words to make things sound more edible when in fact they may not be as good as you think.

If you know of any label ingredients you come across that need to be mentioned (good or bad) then please let me know and I will add them to the list.

Label Information:

Look at how things are listed:

Higher value named meat products may be stored more carefully (colder and cleaner) than by unnamed meat and meat meal.

Protein should always be listed first. Although look closer, check out how it has been listed.

For example:

Chicken, Lamb, Beef – yes that is the way you want to see the food listed.

Chicken meal, Lamb meal, Beef meal – not the ideal cuts from the animal but still have some nutritional value

Meat, Animal – this could be

from any animal or multiple types of animals.

Meat meal, animal meal – this could be any part of any animal such as skin, connective tissue, bone, beaks etc.

A note to remember is that 'meat' and 'meal' could differ in ingredients for each batch made. Which could explain why one week you like the food and the next you don't.

Protein:

Chicken – great source of protein and easier digestible for sensitive stomachs

Duck – great source of protein, omega 3 & 6, good for a healthier coat

Egg – great source of protein and fat with a good selection of vitamins and minerals

Lamb – great source of protein and good for coats, skin and hip/joint care

Salmon – great source of protein and omega and amino acids that are good for health and energy

Salmon oil – good for Omega 3 and 6 which helps prevent skin allergy and inflammation

Trout – Great protein source with low saturated fats and high in omega 3, good for joint protection and mobility

Turkey – great source of protein and easier digestion

Vegetables, Grain and Fruits:

Fresh and whole are fine listed higher in the ingredients list as they still contain all of their natural nutrient and vitamins.

If they are listed as processed foods such as rice bran etc. as long as they are lower in the list than the fresh or whole vegetables, grain or fruit they are not ideal but okay.

The scientific stuff:

There is always the lot of long scientific words we cannot say, never mind know what they are. Don't be frightened to write them down and look them up to see what they are.

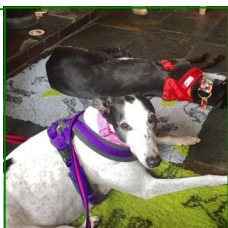

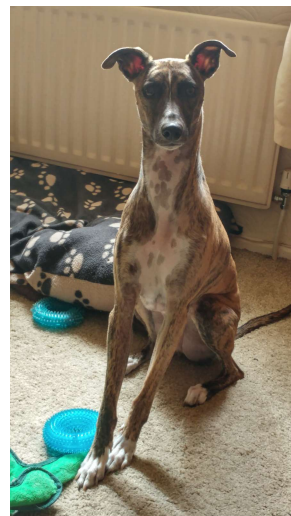
